Juan Carlos Dumas, Ph.D., LMHC, CCP

Juan Carlos Dumas is a well-known Argentine-born psychotherapist with 25 years of professional experience, a published writer, international academic and university professor who has lived in New York since 1989. Dr. Dumas has a Master's degree in Mental Health Counseling from Long Island University, where he received the *Distinguished Performance Award* and teaches graduate-level courses.
